





Part 3 Ready to Write

Using the Planning My Writing graphic organizer, complete a shared writing about the topic on chart paper

When the writing is completed reread with students.

Using the Parts of Informative Writing anchor chart labels, allow students to label the topic sentence, facts, definition and closing sentence on the anchor chart

Model how to include a picture with captions and labels for more information and us anchor labels to reinforce nonfiction text feature vocabulary.




